

SOUP: THE MIRACLE MULTIPLIER

"Pastor Paul, how do you feed your students on 2 cents a day?"

A few years ago, our BLC nurse said the students were regularly sick in class, since they had nothing to eat at home before school. Her solution was to give a little broth and crackers, which stopped the sick students' painful stomach cramps.

Shortly after, we started feeding all of our 500 students. American friends had started giving to our "Jericho Lunch Program." We had funding for 2 cents per child per day, so we made soup...lots of it, in huge kettles over wood fires. On Monday was *arroz caldo* (spicy chicken & rice soup). Tuesday was *chamorado* (chocolate and rice soup). Wednesday was *lugaw* (creamy rice soup). Thursday was *loomi* (creamy noodles in gravy), while Friday was either spaghetti or fruit salad, depending on how much money BLC's cooks had left at the end of the week.

Part of BLC has a flat roof. To conserve funds we're growing some of our own food on the cement portion of BLC's roof. We experimented with chickens, but many flew off the roof and were eaten by wild dogs, down on the ground. We tried growing vegetables, but they became burned by the hot rooftop sun.

After consultation with some agriculturalists and horticulturalists in various countries, I designed an arborarium, which is now under construction. Its roof is made of climbing vegetables like pole beans, which are climbing on a solid, metal and plastic pipe structure. The depth of the garden area is two feet, with 6 inches of topsoil and 18 inches of porous coconut husks, for water retention. A foot under this plant-roof is a compressor, which sprays water through a crisscross network of perforated pipes, onto the plants below, from pipes above, four times a day.

For fertilizer, 20% of the rooftop area is sectioned off for 200 egg-laying hens. They will sit on three tiers of coarse-mesh chicken-wire shelves, with sheet metal beneath to remove the dung. The dung will be dried in the sun daily, to avoid smelly accumulation. Then it will be dug into the garden for fertilizer.

The 200 eggs daily will feed our 500 kids twice a week. The edge of the garden is a cement half-wall and school sign, which shades the plants and animals from our hot tropical Philippine sun.

Hunger will not deter our precious 500 BLC students from doing their very best in their studies. We're now seeing God's plan in meeting yet another need for these destitute children.

GOD HAS PERFECT TIMING

"What are we going to do: waiting 2 hrs for our boat?"

Last month Elvie and I went to a convention in Bohol, Philippines. We flew only part way, and rode the boat the rest of the way. The sea was so choppy that Elvie and many passengers threw up from seasickness on the 2-hour trek.

On our return trip, the shuttle from the convention to the pier was scheduled for 9am. Our boat would depart at 10:30. Our hotel was close to the pier. I figured we could easily walk the distance instead. However, since we had luggage to carry, I agreed to ride the hotel's free shuttle.

The shuttle drove us to the airport by mistake, which shaved off about 20 minutes from our waiting time. We got to the pier at 9:27. A sign at the window of the ticket counter said all their boats were in dry-dock indefinitely, since a few days previous, one of their ships had sunk near another Philippine Island, and many passengers had drowned.

Oh no, how were we to catch our connecting flight in Cebu City, if there was no boat to get us there? Another boat, from a different shipping company, was tied to the pier, and was headed for the same destination. But it was to leave at 9:30!

In 3 minutes we got a refund for our round-trip tickets, bought new tickets, and hopped onto the alternate company's ship, getting us to Cebu City in time to catch our flight back to Davao! God had a reason for that early shuttle from the convention! His timing was perfect... and nobody got sick!!

KIDS WITHOUT MONEY STILL HAVE BRAINS

"Pastor Paul, why waste your time trying to educate those slow-minded poor kids?"

Some people think that children from poor families do not have the mental capacity for higher learning. At BLC, most of our students are very poor. Some don't even live in homes with four walls, but instead, in alleys walled with clotheslines of their hand-washed clothes. Our 17 teachers are trained to challenge the kids to try their best. They also have more experienced kids help the slow-learners to catch up.

Scholastics is not the only tool by which we can measure these kids' abilities. Sports are a fantastic tool. One intellectually taxing game these kids can play is chess. A winner has to think three moves ahead of his or her opponent. Davao has annual tournaments, with mostly wealthy children, competing at a level of intellect which I can only gasp at.

A BLC dad helped start a chess team. When our kids came in first place last year in a citywide tournament, they decided to "go national." Fortunately, this year's PCA (Philippine Chess Association) tournament was in Davao City. Although BLC did not place in the top five finalists, we were awarded a trophy for the largest delegation from one institution: 125 children (one-fourth of our student body) participated!

Many of our BLC kids won seven or eight games in a row! See, even poor kids have potential, if only we are willing to let them try! Thank you to all who pay \$25 per month to sponsor your poor Filipino student at BLC!
