BARNER CHRISTIAN ACADEMY'S ANNUAL PHILIPPINE CULTURE DAY

"Bayani!" (Hero) Elvie shared how her first exposure to public speaking, four decades ago as a young elementary student, led to her willingness to be a community leader today. However, that first memorized message in the early 1970s had been mixed with frightful tears on her part. She did finish the entire speech, though, and every successive speech in her career brought on newfound confidence.

Barner Christian Academy's "Buwan ng Wika" (Culture Day) presented this same unique opportunity for our own little pupils. Dances, speeches, songs and native costumes were featured by the BCA preschoolers on campus. The judges for the costumes were Elvie, our school auditor and me.

In Elvie's opening speech, she challenged the parents and children in the Philippine language, "Mabuhay ang Pilipino!" (Do your best, Filipinos!) Teacher Eunalyn reminded the children that they should be courageous, even as Jose Rizal, a martyr and national hero of the Philippines, exemplified.

Little boys wore either barongs (made of the threads of finely-woven pineapple fibers) or white t-shirts with

colorful yellow, red or blue tubow (neckerchiefs). Girls wore Spanish/Philippine-style dresses with "butterfly-sleeves", or else the washer-woman-style plaid skirt and colorful head scarves.

As the children approached the stage and performed class-by-class, the background music challenged all present with messages like "Whoever doesn't love the Philippine language is like a smelly fish." One boy sang a solo in his scratchy, monotone voice; "I am a Filipino," while his classmates waved small Philippine flags. He was accompanied on tape by majestic drums, cymbals, violins, piano and trumpets.

One class paired up, boys and girls, who sang in Filipino, "You're my brother, you're my sister," while mirror-imaging each other, then dancing while clapping to the beat. Then each would bow or curtsey to his or her partner. Finally, after the closing prayer, we all shared Philippine delicacies: bico (sweet, sticky rice), puto (tiny muffins made of rice flour), purple calamay (sticky pudding made from the UBE root) and cuchinta (small, brown, round custard-cakes topped with shredded coconut). Praise God for talented kids, proud of their Philippine heritage!
